How Expert Witness Billing Works

Expert witness billing is structured differently from most legal services. Experts typically charge separate rates for consulting, report writing, deposition testimony, and trial testimony — with trial rates being the highest. Most require an upfront retainer, and total engagement costs can range from \$5,000 for a simple case review to \$100,000+ for complex multi-expert litigation. Understanding the fee structure is the first step to controlling costs.

The 52% Rule

Expert witnesses charge an average of 52% more for trial testimony than for file review and preparation. Budget accordingly — trial-phase costs are dramatically higher than consulting-phase costs.

The "Testifying Premium"

Experts with 50+ prior deposition and trial appearances command 30-50% higher rates than equivalently credentialed experts with fewer appearances. You're paying for courtroom composure and cross-examination resilience, not just opinions.

Retainer and Payment Structures

How Expert Witnesses Get Paid

Retainer Norms

Retainer Type	Amount	How It Works
Initial retainer (consultation phase)	\$2,500–\$5,000	Advance deposit; expert bills against it; replenishment required when depleted
Report phase retainer	\$5,000–\$15,000	Triggered when expert begins drafting Rule 26 report
Trial retainer	\$5,000–\$25,000	Secured before trial; covers testimony + preparation time
Non-refundable booking fee	\$1,000–\$5,000	Secures specific trial dates on expert's calendar; forfeited if case settles

Common Fee Structures

Structure	Description	When Used
Hourly (most common)	Flat hourly rate for all work, with different rates by activity type	85%+ of engagements
Flat fee (case review only)	Fixed price for initial review and preliminary opinion	Small cases; attorney wants cost certainty
Hybrid	Flat fee for report + hourly for testimony	Used when scope of report is well-defined
Contingency	Expert fee tied to case outcome	NEVER acceptable — destroys credibility; violates most ethics codes

Never retain an expert on contingency.

Expert witness ethics rules (and Daubert case law) require experts to be compensated regardless of outcome. A contingency arrangement is devastating on cross-examination and may disqualify the expert entirely.

Hidden Fees & Add-Ons

Always request a detailed fee schedule and engagement letter before retaining. The hourly rate is rarely the full picture. Budget 25-40% above the base hourly estimate for add-ons.

Add-On	Typical Cost	When It Applies
Travel time (to/from deposition or trial)	50-100% of hourly rate	Expert charges for travel time, not just on-site time
Airfare, hotel, meals	Actual cost (first-class travel common)	Out-of-market experts; some demand business/first class
Cancellation fee (< 48 hours)	\$1,000-\$5,000	Lost revenue from cancelled deposition/trial date
Cancellation fee (< 7 days for trial)	\$2,500-\$10,000	Expert blocked their calendar for your trial
Deposition preparation time	Full hourly rate (4-8 hrs typical)	Expert reviews materials and prepares for depo questioning
Trial preparation time	Full hourly rate (8-20 hrs typical)	Prep for direct and anticipated cross-examination
Rush report surcharge	+25-50%	Report needed in less than 2 weeks
Portal / platform access fees	\$200-\$500	Expert referral platforms charge matching or access fees
Administrative / paralegal support	\$75-\$150/hr	Expert's support staff billing for document organization
Research and literature review	Full hourly rate	Expert reviews academic literature relevant to opinions
Rebuttal report	Full hourly rate (10-20 hrs)	Responding to opposing expert's report
Minimum billing increments	0.25-1.0 hour	Some experts bill in 1-hour increments — a 15-min call costs \$500

Request the expert's complete fee schedule including: hourly rates by activity, retainer amounts, cancellation policy, travel policy (economy vs. business class), and minimum billing increment. Get this in writing before the engagement letter is signed.

How to Negotiate Better Expert Fees

Numbered list

- 1 Negotiate travel policy upfront.** First-class airfare and premium hotels are the biggest hidden costs. Negotiate economy/coach travel or a flat travel stipend.
- 2 Set a budget cap with milestones.** Retain the expert for "initial review and preliminary opinion" (capped at 10 hours) before committing to a full engagement.
- 3 Compare 3+ experts at similar credential levels.** Rate variation within the same specialty can be 50-100%. Mid-career experts with 20-50 depositions offer the best value.
- 4 Negotiate the minimum billing increment.** Push for 0.1 or 0.25-hour increments instead of 1-hour blocks. This prevents a 10-minute phone call from costing \$500.
- 5 Use local experts when possible.** Eliminate travel fees entirely by retaining an expert within driving distance of the deposition or courthouse.
- 6 Front-load preparation efficiently.** Send organized, indexed materials (not raw document dumps). Expert time spent organizing your files is wasted money.
- 7 Negotiate cancellation terms.** Push for 72-hour (not 7-day) cancellation windows. Offer a reduced cancellation fee (50% of daily rate) rather than full lost-day charges.
- 8 Bundle deposition and trial rates.** Some experts will discount 10-15% if retained for the entire case (consulting through trial) rather than piecemeal.
- 9 Avoid "marquee" experts when unnecessary.** For standard-of-care opinions in routine med mal, a well-credentialed mid-career expert is as effective as a \$1,000/hr department chair.
- 10 Get a realistic hour estimate upfront.** Ask the expert: "Based on the materials I've described, how many hours do you estimate for review, report, and testimony?" Hold them to it.
